State of the Society

President **Peter Goldstein**, BRN '08 highlighted recovery as the core theme for 2022. Undergraduate recruitment more than doubled in Fall 2021 compared to 2020, not to mention the successful founding of the Flint Affiliate at Kettering University in Spring 2022. The Society has also continued to remove barriers for both undergraduate and graduate chapters: the pay-what-you-can initiation fee model is working thanks to our generous alumni donors, and the Graduate Chapter Support committee was founded to guide new graduate chapters to incorporation and beyond.
