The past year has been like no other. Separated from our siblings by the pandemic, and facing tremendous uncertainty for the future of the country, these are surely not the circumstances I expected for my first year as your president. But as I look back, I feel tremendous pride and optimism about who we have shown ourselves to be, and about the Society's future.

## Adapting to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Congregating remains unsafe, and whether students have been learning from home, or in a highly restricted mode on campus, the undergraduate experience has been completely transformed. These conditions have placed every one of our chapters at risk. In the absence of spontaneous in-person interaction, it takes a lot more work to remain close and to bond with new members. 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# **Society Statement on Black Lives Matter**

### On June 5, 2020, the Alpha Delta Phi Society released the following statement:

The Alpha Delta Phi Society states its unequivocal support for the Black Lives Matter movement and the protests taking place in cities across the United States and throughout the world.

As an organization founded on equity, we understand that not all lives are valued equally in the United States. The U.S. has a centuries—long history of racism and violence against the Black community, and it is long past time for us as an organization to speak out against these injustices. We also understand that it is not our place to tell Black people how and when to make their frustration heard, and will strive instead to uplift Black activists in their fight for justice.

For too long, the police have abused their power and murdered Black people with impunity. And for too long, Black people have mourned, marched, chanted, and demanded justice. It's time for the nation as a whole to stand behind the Black Lives Matter movement and its demands.

We are proud of our many siblings who have taken to the streets this week to demand justice, contributed financially, called their local politicians, initiated difficult conversations with friends and family, and provided support in other ways. And we hope that those who haven't will take this opportunity to stand on the right side of history.

To our Black siblings, we stand in solidarity with you. It's on all of us to ensure that the Alpha Delta Phi Society is a safe and welcoming space. That means recognizing and admitting to our own implicit biases, taking steps to change ourselves and our organization, and supporting movements for justice vocally, physically, and financially.

None of us are free until we are all free. Black lives matter.

The fact is that every day, after getting home from work at six, he fills his gills in the garage before coming to dinner, chuckling at his drowning wife while his sons tread water in the dark spot on his forehead, untangle their hands from the red of his eye. They say please and thank you, eat from the reheated pot, ask to be excused. Ten minutes before takeoff, stumbling back to the gate, he trips and lands face-first on the walkway, dead fish, fresh mess, everyone turning away while he flops.

## Brunonian Chapter Hosts 2020 Society Convention & Leadership Training Conference

The Brunonian Chapter hosted the 20th Annual Society Convention and Leadership Training Conference March 5–8 at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island.

Most Convention business sessions were held in the Chancellor's Dining Room on Brown's campus. One of the most notable aspects of business was the Convention approving Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute's petition for Charter. *(See page 14 for this story.)* 

During Friday and Saturday business sessions, attendees were able to attend Open Space sessions led by Mads O'Brien, Middletown 2016. Throughout the weekend, 36 sessions were held by a number of siblings to discuss current projects such as updating the Society Pledge Manual, looking at the Society's role in addressing climate change and sustainability, and how to handle interpersonal relationships in undergraduate chapters.

Two leadership training sessions took place during the weekend. The Society again teamed up with Uplift for a presentation about power dynamics, consent, and healthy relationships hosted by Christine Chapman, Brunonian 2014.

In partnership with Brown University, Jeremy Wallace presented the keynote titled *Taking Allyship to the Next Level*, allowing siblings to reflect on ways to be an ally, and led to a breakout session focused on allyship within the Society.

For the eighth year in a row, the Development Committee led the Convention Donation Matching Challenge to encourage young alumni and undergraduates to contribute to the Society. The Development Committee engaged with attendees through updates during the weekend, hosting thank you note writing sessions, and *(Continued on page 7)*

# Middletown Chapter's Matching Campaign

At the end of last semester, the Middletown Chapter had \$6,300 remaining in its budget because the semester was cut short due to COVID–19.

In June, the membership decided to donate that money to various organizations that support Black Lives Matter and the protests that were occurring around the country. They also started a social media matching campaign to raise more money on top of its \$6,300.

A group of about eight members met to determine where they wanted to donate the money and concluded that they would split it between local Middletown organizations and national organizations.

Thanks to a large number of our members sharing information about the matching campaign, the Chapter raised a total of \$2,284, and have thus far donated \$2,000 to a GoFundMe set up to support first–generation and low–income Wesleyan students through the pandemic, and \$2,000 to a Middletown mutual aid fund.

The Chapter still needs to donate the rest of the money, and are currently determining where it will be most impactful as the needs of certain organizations have changed since the matching campaign began in June.

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# **From the Chapters**

**Binghamton:** Last fall, the chapter decided not to take a pledge class so they could focus their energy on preparing for a virtual pledge process in the spring. They renamed their literary magazine—previously known as *Harvey*—to *Eells* and released the first issues in November. Binghamton has seen a drop in active membership but has used this time to become closer (virtually!) as they try to lift each other's spirits.

**Brunonian:** A successful virtual initiation ceremony allowed the chapter to initiate nine new members last fall. In order to allow undergraduates and alumni to feel right at home during initiation, the chapter hosted a virtual after party through a platform called Gather, where everyone was able to interact in a virtual model of the Brunonian house.

**Capital:** CAP held a successful virtual rush period and recruited four new members. Some of their virtual recruitment events included a virtual scavenger hunt, tea time, new skill night, and a Netflix party. During the recruitment period, they hosted a virtual Blind Date, including a book event on Instagram to help raise money for We Need Diverse Books, a nonprofit with the goal of promoting diversity in children's literature and publishing. They continue to maintain a presence for students by hosting events with other student organizations, such as a virtual creative writing workshop with GW's literary magazine.

**Columbia:** The chapter focused on getting their pledge class from last spring initiated, and they have three members sitting on a temporary Executive Board who are leading the chapter through finishing pledge education and finalizing elections.

Middletown: Middletown has put a lot of effort into making sure there are adequate mental health—and other—resources for their members living in the house and on campus. They also initiated their spring pledge class on October 24. While planning for the future of their organization, they decided to create a new chaplain position specifically to support their BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) members.

New Leaf: At the beginning of the fall semester, New Leaf participated in the Society's virtual initiation by welcoming three members into the chapter. To successfully get things off the ground, they held a sticker sale as a way to raise funds. **Penn:** Penn also took part in the Society's virtual initiation at the beginning of last semester and later hosted a successful virtual recruitment with plans to move into pledging soon. The chapter is also working on a social media series to highlight their undergraduate and alumni. Additionally, Penn helped raise money for unhoused folks in the Philadelphia area and is planning to set up a violence prevention training. Throughout the pandemic so far, the chapter has maintained its spirit and have been doing a great job of staying connected.

**Rensselaer:** In addition to a successful virtual initiation at the beginning of the fall semester and then the start of a virtual pledging process, the chapter is finding special ways to stay connected through several fun and safe activities.

**Ursinus:** The Chapter held a successful virtual recruitment and recently initiated two new members in a fun, socially distanced ceremony. They also hosted a socially distanced member dinner to ensure that everyone is staying connected and engaged.

**Bowdoin Graduate:** Bowdoin hosted its annual meeting in June via Zoom, and they hope that they will be able to return to our former chapter house for our annual weekend in the summer of 2021. The chapter is hosting a weekly Zoom conversation on Saturdays at 3 p.m. eastern. E-mail <u>meeting@adpsbowdoin.org</u> if you would like to join in. President emeritus Andie Dolan, RPI 2019 and 2020, helped navigate the chapter during the transition period when the founding class graduated.

"As the first non–founder to be the president, Andie had to handle a major transition of personnel and development goals," Erin Solomon, RPI 2019.5 said. "Without her, there is a real chance the chapter would have collapsed."

Alvah Higginson and Brother Chaz Bernstein, both RPI 2022, have kept the sense of family throughout the COVID-19 pandemic by continuing membership events and are experimenting with online recruitment. The chapter continues to redefine what literature and family mean to the group. Undergraduate members are excited to be able to fully participate in future national conventions and are now working toward future membership goals and potential group housing. The pandemic has put a damper on celebrating the chapter's accomplishments, but the chapter has now solidified its place nationally and locally.

# Meet the New Society Graduate Governors

### Irissa Cisternino, Capital 2018

Irissa has been heavily involved in the Society ever since she became a member in 2016. As an undergraduate, she was the Capital Chapter's Philanthropy Chair for two semesters and later served as the Chapter's Inter-Chapter Relations Chair. She's currently a



member of the Capital Graduate Chapter's Board of Directors and is assisting with its incorporation efforts.

As a member of the Lifelong Experience Committee, Irissa launched the Society's Senior Advising program, a companion initiative to the larger mentoring program that assists senior undergraduates with their transition out of college by partnering them with young graduate members. She has also coordinated the Society's Book Club since February 2018.

Professionally, Irissa is a Ph.D. student in sociology at Stony Brook University. Her research focuses broadly on gender, media, and the internet, and she is interested in computational methodologies and mixed-methods research.

### Isabella "Isa" Bello Martinez, Brunonian 2017

Since graduating from Brown in 2017 and later from an accelerated master's program in Engineering, Science, Technology and Entrepreneurship at the University of Notre Dame, Isa has been involved with a variety of efforts,



mostly centered on Expansion. She is now a Co-Director of Expansion (with Max Morant, Penn 2016).

Isa led the Society's Pledge Manual Rewrite Project and managed a group of more than ten volunteers for a year by trying to coordinate with the Fraternity to get original documents, recording the oral histories of Pledge Educators and Expansions Chairs to write the new sections, and adding our songs and new traditions.

Max has served on the Society's Development Team and its Chapter Services team. He's currently President of the Penn Graduate Chapter and is the Society's Co-Director of Expansion (with Isabella "Isa" Bello Martinez, Brunonian 2017).

Professionally, Max works as a programmer for a financial services firm, working in the foreign exchange trading team.

### Ashley Taylor, Granite 2013

Ashley pledged the then–Granite Affiliate during her first semester as a freshman at the University of New Hampshire. Lured by the prospect of a road trip to another chapter, she ended up attending her first Undergraduate Caucus the day



after she was initiated in December 2009. Ashley served as Chapter Secretary for three consecutive semesters, as well as Social Chair, Pledge Master, and Chapter President as an undergraduate.

have lost income from on-campus jobs, and most other chapter revenue streams have been cut off. At the national organization, we have focused on providing resources and reducing burdens on our student members in order to ensure their continued survival.

In the spring, Laura Hellwig, Capital 2016, led the Finance Committee in redesigning the Society's budget. Focused on keeping our chapters afloat, we decreased fees and increased funds available for grants to chapters. Starting this year, our new member fees are "Pay What You Can" with no burden of proof for student means. We also tripled the funds available for grants to chapters, to shore up their ability to spend quality time together and to advertise to new members. On top of helping our chapters to keep the lights on, we believe this investment in our members reflects our values, and our goal to make the Society as inclusive as possible, irrespective of financial means.

Melissa Diaz, Brunonian 2011, transformed our Chapter Services program by appointing dedicated liaisons for each of our chapters, and now the team is helping students in more ways than ever before. With three times as many volunteers, they have developed a streamlined process for getting Society funds directly to chapters that need them. They have focused on providing resources for personal connection, recruitment, and initiation in an online–only landscape. Together with our Undergraduate Parliament, the Chapter Services team have made cross–chapter connections. At a time where every aspect of chapter leadership—from chaplain to treasurer—needs new ideas, this kind of cross–pollination of ideas is invaluable.

We have embraced the need to move events online and benefited tremendously from the energy and expertise of our volunteers. Ellie Baker, Brunonian 2019, began a cross-chapter initiative to develop a toolkit for conducting online initiation ceremonies. We then assisted chapters in operating those initiations.

Thanks to this phenomenal planning, and a strong showing of alum presence, new members saw our family come together to demonstrate its commitment to their success. Kylie Madden, Capital 2017, is leading the effort to develop a virtual Convention for March 2021. While an online–only event is motivated primarily by safety concerns, the team is excited by the opportunity to include siblings from around the world without the cost and time of travel.

### We Keep Moving Forward

The pandemic has taken a lot of our energy, but our young leaders continue to remake the Society into an ever more just and admirable organization.

We have begun an initiative to assist chapters with community healing around instances of conflict and harm. Inspired by the philosophy of transformative justice, Isabella Martinez, Brunonian 2017, led a team to write a statement on our approach, emphasizing healing relationships. Cailyn Hansen, Brunonian 2019, is now in charge of a team that will work with interested chapters to develop procedures for rebuilding relationships when there has been interpersonal harm.

Max Morant, Penn 2015, and Isabella Martinez, Brunonian 2017, began 2020 with plans for growing our Society to new schools, and collaborated on defining criteria on where to go next. It turned out to be a very tough year to start a new Greek chapter: not only did many schools freeze their Greek onboarding processes, but we feared that the current wave of anti–Greek sentiment on some campuses might dampen enthusiasm for our Society. Despite all this, our reputation precedes us. Students at multiple schools reached out to us, looking to change Greek life on their campus by forming a chapter of the  $A\Delta\Phi$  Society. Conversations with these inspiring students are ongoing.

At Convention 2020, we hosted a speaker on allyship and the transgender experience in America. In the conversations sparked by that session, Chris Jackson, Middletown 2020, invited us to examine the ways in which systemic and passive racism influence the experience of Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) in the Society. Haley Brush, Ursinian 2017, and Chris are leading a collaboration with The Wells Collective to bring anti–racist training to the 2021 Convention, and to consult with Society leaders to help us put our anti–racist values into action.

I want to close by extending my heartfelt thanks to our volunteers. Their ideas define the Society's agenda; their diligence makes those dreams a reality; their values form the heart of the community we share. Thanks to their efforts, and to the indispensable generosity of donors, I have every confidence that we have a bright future, and that we will continue to embody the high ideals upon which the Society was founded.
